Fire Chief Jelinek provided a presentation on a request to approve the purchase of two (2) Pierce Manufacturing, Inc. fire engines from Golden State Fire Apparatus. He discussed the fire department's apparatus replacement program and program goals, issues with current apparatus, and solutions the department is working towards to help remediate those issues. Chief Jelinek spoke about the department's vehicle scoring system to determine the life expectancy of their vehicles and provided justification for the requested purchase. He also provided the explanation for the green sheet (hereto attached as Attachment A) which showed the comparison of a 100% pre-payment versus payment at the time of delivery. Staff recommended payment at time of delivery which would result in a greater return to the City by investing the funds in a U.S. Treasury Note versus a pre-payment discount. Chief Jelinek gave credit to Councilmember Abram for making the recommendation to staff.

RE: AMENDMENT TO ACTION ITEM 8B STAFF REPORT & RESOLUTION

Staff respectfully submits the following amendment to Action Item 8B. Based on the comparison of Option A (100% pre-payment) and Option B (payment at time of delivery or pickup) offered by Golden State Fire Apparatus, staff is modifying its recommendation from Option A to Option B due to financial analysis resulting in a greater return to the City by investing the funds in a U.S. Treasury Note vs. a pre-payment discount.

WHEREAS, the Turlock Fire Department is in need of two (2) new fire engines;

WHEREAS, the purchase of these two new fire engines is in alignment with the Fire Department's fire apparatus fleet replacement program; and

and

WHEREAS, modernizing our fire apparatus fleet will reduce maintenance costs and out of service time due to mechanical issues; and

WHEREAS, the City of Turlock will <u>invest the funds in a 3-Year U.S. Treasury</u> <u>Note with an annual rate of return of 3.98%, thus providing the City with a cumulative</u> <u>three (3) year return of 11.98% totaling save \$281,940149,147.37 Pre-Payment Discount</u> for 100% Payment at Time of Order from Golden State Fire Apparatus (Golden State); and

WHEREAS, it is estimated we will receive delivery of these two engines approximately 38.5 to 42.5 months from the order date to date of delivery; and

WHEREAS, the funds to purchase the new fire engines will come from Measure A – General unrestricted reserves; and

WHEREAS, HGACBuy, a government procurement service administered by the Houston-Galveston Area Council of Governments (HGAC), conducted a competitive

procurement of fire apparatus and equipment, resulting in a contract with Pierce Manufacturing, Inc. (Pierce); and

WHEREAS, as a member of HGACBuy, Turlock Fire Department obtained a quote from sales agent Golden State to acquire two (2) Pierce fire engines, specifically one Pierce Velocity 1500 GPM Pumper, and a Pierce Velocity 1500 GPM PUC[™] Pumper, for a one-time payment not to exceed \$2,<u>354192,830.35491.02</u>; and

WHEREAS, Staff recommends utilizing HGACBuy for procurement of fire apparatus to acquire two (2) Pierce fire engines, specifically one (1) Pierce Velocity 1500 GPM Pumper, and ONE (1) Pierce Velocity 1500 GPM PUC[™] Pumper, for a one-time payment not to exceed \$2,<u>354192,830.35491.02</u>; and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to Turlock Municipal Code (TMC) Section 2-7-08(b)(5) bidding procedures are not required when engaged in a joint, cooperative, or leveraged purchasing plans that have been solicited and awarded on a competitive basis.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council of the City of Turlock approves the purchase of two (2) Pierce Manufacturing, Inc. fire engines from Golden State Fire Apparatus: one (1) Velocity 1500 GPM Pumper and one (1) Velocity 1500 GPM PUC[™] Pumper without compliance to the formal bid procedure pursuant to Turlock Municipal Code Section 2-7-08(b)(5) and appropriates funds from unrestricted reserves in Fund 118 "Measure A – General", Account Number 118-30-300.48001_09051020 "Transfer Out Vehicle & Equipment Replacement" to Fund 506 "Vehicle/Equipment Replacement" Account Number 506-00-00-304.38001_090 "Transfers In Vehicle & Equip Replacement" to be expensed out of Account Number 506-00-000-304.51020" Equipment Replacement" in an amount not to exceed \$2,354192,830491.3502.

1. ACTION RECOMMENDED:

2. SYNOPSIS:

This action will approve the purchase of two (2) fire engines, with an estimated delivery date of January 2027. Once received, these engines will be placed into frontline service in place of the apparatus currently utilized as Squad 32 and Engine 34.

3. DISCUSSION OF ISSUE:

In any fire department, the backbone of service delivery is safe and reliable fire apparatus which can quickly deliver firefighters and essential gear to an emergency scene. Fire engines, like any other vehicle, have a finite life. Through age and use, reliability decreases for these apparatus. Our recent Citygate report, in alignment with national best-practices, recommends we establish the expected useful service life of our apparatus fleet by considering the type of use, apparatus age, mileage, reliability, and repair/maintenance costs. Generally speaking, older fire engines with higher mileage require more frequent repairs and are less operationally reliable. It is ultimately up to each agency to determine a planned fleet replacement timeline best suited for their apparatus. To establish replacement criteria for Turlock Fire Department we utilized the *Fire Apparatus Service Life Scoring Rubric* found within the recent Citygate Fire Services Master Plan's analysis of Turlock Fire Department (TFD) fleet services. Using the referenced service life factors and scoring criteria, we were able to establish a maximum service life score and subsequent replacement schedule. Based upon this scoring system we are recommending our fire apparatus be kept in service for a total of 15 years, serving ten (10) years as a frontline apparatus and then placed into reserve status for five (5) additional years. Table 1 depicts the scoring rubric:

When new engines are placed into service, frontline engines will transition to reserve status.

4. BASIS FOR RECOMMENDATION:

There are five (5) factors impacting our recommendation to immediately purchase two (2) fire engines. These are 1) Forecasted need for replacement of Squad 32 and Engine 34 in 2027, 2) Financial impacts related to fire apparatus manufacturers' forecast of substantial price increases, 3) Extended apparatus delivery time from our recommended vendor, 4) Safety considerations, and 5) Fleet standardization. These issues will be discussed in detail below.

1. Forecasted need: Based upon the referenced apparatus condition score Squad 32 and Engine 34 should transition from frontline to reserve status in 2027. These two engines, placed in service in 2017, received 22 and 21 points respectively and are currently rated in good condition. Assuming current usage remains steady (or

increases slightly due to expected increased calls for service), scoring for these apparatus in four years would add approximately 10 points each (totaling 32 and 31 points respectively) and qualify them for transition to reserve apparatus status.

- 2. Financial impacts: there are several factors impacting our decision to purchase now rather than wait three to four (3-4) years until purchase.
 - Prices have already increased dramatically due to supply chain issues and inflation. Purchase price for our two (2) new Pierce engines in April of 2022 was \$877,555 for each unit. Current pricing of an identical engine from Pierce is \$1,059,289, reflecting a price increase of nearly 18% in only one year.
 - b. Cummings, the primary producer of fire engine motors, is reducing their motor options from five_(5) to two (2). These two (2) motors are larger than needed for our fleet and will add an additional cost to each apparatus of approximately \$50,000.
 - c. Golden State Fire Apparatus representatives anticipate at least a 24% increase in fire apparatus pricing over the next four (4) years. Factoring for these increases, plus future motor and/or component upgrades, the conservative estimate for purchasing the same two (2) engines in 2026 increases from \$2.2 million to over \$3.2 million dollars.
 - d. Modernizing our fleet will reduce annual repair and maintenance costs.
 - e. Acceptance of two (2) new engines will enable TFD to surplus and sell two (2) reserve engines. The two (2) engines, which currently serve in frontline service, would transition to reserve status to maintain depth in our reserve fleet.
- 3. Extended apparatus delivery timeframe: _-Due to a high volume of fire apparatus orders, supply chain issues, and lack of necessary components, vendors are advising of apparatus delivery times of approximately three to four (3-4) years. Delaying purchase increases the likelihood that we will not be able to replace apparatus on our intended replacement schedule. This in turn increases the likelihood of mechanical issues with these apparatus. This purchase proactively addresses the aging fleet and reduces repair and maintenance costs.
- 4. Safety considerations: In recent years substantial safety improvements have been made to fire apparatus. These include improved rollover stability, tire pressure indicators, seat belt warning systems requiring all occupants to be properly seated and belted, roadability, including minimum accelerations and top speed limitations, enhanced step and work surface lighting, and improved cab integrity testing. This purchase would enhance the safety of firefighters using these apparatus.
- 5. Standardization: This purchase provides standardization across the TFD front line apparatus fleet. There is a tremendous benefit in having an entire fleet with the same build. Parts and inventory would be standard, and downtimes would therefore be decreased. Having a standardized, reliable fleet platform would also reduce training

requirements and liability. In addition, this would help to standardize fire department apparatus with our regional fire service partners within Modesto-Stanislaus Consolidated-Turlock (MST) system. It is also the preferred vendor for City of Modesto fleet maintenance services where our apparatus are currently serviced.

Pursuant to Turlock Municipal Code (TMC) Section 2-7-08(b)(5) bidding procedures are not required when engaged in a joint, cooperative, or leveraged purchasing plans that have been solicited and awarded on a competitive basis. On June 27, 2019, HGAC issued Bid No. FS12-19 for all types of fire apparatus. Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC) is a cooperative purchasing program (HGACBuy) that establishes contracts that have gone through a competitive bid or proposal process that can be used by a state agency, municipality, special district, or other political subdivision of a state or qualifying non-profit corporation.

5. FISCAL IMPACT / BUDGET AMENDMENT:

The proposed funding source is Measure A – General, unrestricted reserves. The net budget impact of this project is \$2,354192,830491.3502. Our preferred payment method is 100% payment at time of <u>delivery</u>, which allows the City of Turlock to invest the funds in a 3-Year U.S. Treasury Note, with a current market annual interest rate of 3.98%, thus providing the City with cumulative three (3) year return of 11.98% totaling \$281,940. order, which results in a prepayment discount of \$149,147.37 (a 7% reduction in the overall purchase price). The cost breakdown is as follows:
